A year of growth

WITH ANOTHER BUSY YEAR

behind us, I want to share some exciting developments and key projects designed to serve our growing membership that were discussed during our Annual Meeting.

Last year, we focused heavily on making the most of the internal expertise we have here at the co-op. This included cross-training that led to a permanent leadership switch between departments. Amy Langdon and Bryan Reece switched their roles as vice presidents of Member Service and Information Technology. This move provides a fresh perspective and better departmental flow, as their roles are inherently connected.

We also welcomed a familiar face back to the leadership team. Tony Simmons, a long-time employee who briefly retired, has rejoined us as the vice president of Strategy and Risk Management. Tony's return, coupled with his 40-plus years of experience, is a huge benefit to the co-op, helping us align all departments with our strategies and goals.

Innovation to empower our members

We are constantly looking for ways to use new technology, including artificial intelligence (AI), to benefit you, our members.

One of the most impactful new tools we've rolled out is Bidgetly, an energy usage management tool integrated directly into our Smart Hub application. While we could always tell you your total monthly usage, Bidgetly uses an algorithm to identify and break down the energy use of specific appliances such as your refrigerator, hot water heater, and HVAC use. This is a game-changer for high usage issues and energy audits, giving you the power to understand and manage your energy use without having to download new software.

Community investment and outreach

It should be no secret that our commitment to the community goes beyond poles and wires. Through a grant of more than \$250,000 from Google, we partnered with Hope Repair and Pointe North Church to launch an energy efficiency program. This program is specifically designed to help low-income members with poor indoor air quality and potentially dangerous space heaters in their homes. We are installing highly efficient mini-split heat pumps, which drastically reduce utility costs and improve the residents' quality of life. This partnership not only stabilizes the local grid but best of all, there is absolutely no charge to the member for this critical work.

Protecting our system

Starting this month, we will launch a new maintenance program focused on our underground system. Given that we now have more underground lines than overhead, this is essential for resiliency and safety. This program involves clearing a 10-foot space around the opening door of the electrical equipment box, 15-feet above and a 4-foot space around the other sides.

Although we already clear around boxes as needed, this systematic approach to underground safety and reliability is needed to make sure we are not outpaced by the growth of our system. It will also ensure our crews have adequate room to work during routine maintenance and, crucially, speed up restoration times after storms.

We appreciate your support and look forward to another year of finding new and innovative ways to serve our members.

Smarthub security upgrade

With cyber threats evolving and becoming more sophisticated, ensuring the security of your accounts and personal information is more critical than ever. Berkeley Electric is now offering an added layer of security for your Smarthub account by using two-factor authentication.

Two-Factor Authentication is a powerful tool for securing online accounts. By requiring multiple forms of verification, it adds layers of security, making it much more challenging for unauthorized individuals to gain access.

Simply sign up and choose your method of notification to start receiving a unique passcode that will allow you—and only you—to access your Smarthub account. To participate proactively, sign in to your Smarthub account and then under the "Settings" menu, navigate to "Security" and finally "Two-Factor Authentication."

By adopting a robust security strategy that includes Two-Factor Authentication, strong passwords and security phrases, you can significantly enhance your protection against unauthorized access and cybercrime.

Don't crowd the box

We understand the desire to landscape around electrical equipment boxes, such as transformers and switch gears, so they aren't noticeable. However, this equipment is a key component of delivering electricity to area homes and businesses.

The right-of-way clearance boundaries established and posted on the sticker on the electrical equipment itself need to be respected and maintained for your safety, and the safety of our crews. Do not plant or place permanent structures within 10 feet of the door side of the box, within 4 feet of all other sides, or less than 15 feet above the box itself.

Lawn grass, mulch, decorative rock and potted plants are permitted. Small statues, flags and even benches are also permitted as long as they can be easily moved by two people.
