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
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A passion for service

Encouraging educational efforts

OUT OF THE FRYING PAN and into the fire. That is where I find myself after being newly elected to the board of trustees at this year's Annual Meeting, only to find out that I have to write the first column of the year for the magazine. If they had told me that I would have to do this before I decided to run, I may have changed my mind. All joking aside, I thought I would take this opportunity to introduce myself to my fellow members.

My full name is Denver Lee Clayton, but most people call me Lee. I grew up in Goose Creek and graduated from Goose Creek High School before enlisting in the United States Air Force and serving for four years. After the Air Force, I trained as a reserve officer in the Moncks Corner Police Department, which led to a career in law enforcement. I retired from the North Charleston department. school juniors taking part in the Youth Tour and sophomores going to the Youth Summit. I would really like to urge you to have your kids apply for these trips because not only do they sound amazing but both of them are free to members.

Berkeley Electric is also supporting students after high school as well through its Operation Round Up Trust Scholarships. If you aren't familiar with Operation Round Up, it's a program where the co-op rounds up the electric bill of participating members to the next highest dollar amount. I had always seen the program listed on my bill, but I didn't realize all the ways in which those funds were used to help co-op members. This includes the ten \$2,500 Operation Round Up trust scholarships that will open for applications on Jan. 9.

And the co-op didn't forget the teachers either. The Bright Ideas teacher grant program has been revamped to make it easier for more teachers to participate. Teachers can start applying for grants this month all the way through the end of February. The grants will then be awarded by the end of April, giving teachers plenty of time to use the money and create lesson plans well before the new school year begins. From what I understand, the co-op has awarded over \$70,000 in grants since the program started. If you are interested in learning more about any of these programs all you need to do is visit the co-op's website at berkeleyelectric.coop. Each program has an online form which makes applying quick and easy.

I truly am excited to start this next chapter of my life and I am grateful to my fellow members who took the time to come out and vote during the Annual Meeting. When I started this journey, I wanted to be a part of the process to help provide safe, affordable and reliable electricity to the members of Berkeley Electric Cooperative. As I continue to learn more about all the ways that the co-op serves its communities, I am even more excited to be a part of this process. Thank you, once again, and I look forward to serving as your representative for District 5 and to acting to help represent the interests of my fellow members.

New timeline announced for Bright Ideas

It will also help ensure that they will be able to use the grant money to purchase their new classroom supplies and develop lesson plans before the start of the new school year.

\$2,500 scholarships available

The Berkeley Electric Trust Board will start accepting scholarship applications on Jan. 9 for high school seniors whose parents are cooperative members. Up to ten \$2,500 scholarships are available with one being awarded to each high school served by the co-op, including several at-large scholarships.

"The Trust Board recognizes that college tuition continues to rise," board chairman Alton Hood says. "To help keep the college dream alive for our students, the board has chosen to set the scholarship amount at \$2,500. Previously, the amount offered was \$1,000."

The scholarships are funded by the Operation Round Up program. Participating members agree to have their electric bill rounded up to the next highest dollar amount. Those funds are then used for scholarships, to support local non-profits and provide critical home repairs for fellow members.


Students may apply online at berkeleyelectric.coop before the application deadline of March 31. Grade and income requirements apply and the scholarships will be awarded in May.

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Local all-stars give back before bowl game

TIMOTHY CASTAIN is the youngest in his family, so he knows well what it's like to have someone shop for you. But last month, the lineman from Oceanside Collegiate Academy got to experience the flipside.

Castain was among 88 of South Carolina's top high school football players



selected to play in the Touchstone Energy Cooperatives Bowl, an annual all-star game played on Dec. 10 at Doug Shaw Memorial Stadium in Myrtle Beach. A few days before the North team's 22-14 victory over the South, opposing players from each team partnered to assist 44 deserving kids from Horry County schools for a Christmas shopping spree at a local Target store.

"I'm used to people buying stuff for me. Now it's time to buy for someone else," says Castain, one of seven players representing Berkeley Electric's service territory. "It was great to help out the kids and give back to the community."

In addition to Castain, Berkeley Electric area all-stars included Zolten Osborne of Fort Dorchester High, Jordan Turner of Goose Creek High, Tory Gethers of Stratford High, A'Monte McCray of Cross High, Malik Horry, of Hanahan High, Kameron Durant of Cane Bay High and Jack Weil of Lucy Beckham High.

The shopping spree has become a tradition during the bowl week since South Carolina's electric cooperatives began sponsoring the game. The cooperatives provide each child, chosen by school district officials, a \$150 Target gift card to spend on clothes, toys and other items on their Christmas list.

"It's been awesome just letting this kid choose his way through," says Weil, who teamed with Dorman's Graham Smith to help fourth-grader Andre Hadley find the clothes on his list. "What kid has been given \$150 and told to go buy what you want? That's made it a good experience for him and us too."

For some players, the connections made with the kids they escorted were the highlight of the day.

"It's been real fun for me," says Osborne, who helped Tamir Williams of Myrtle Beach Elementary. "He always had a smile on his face and was always kidding around."

In addition to the shopping spree and the game, players also participated in Lineman Demo Day, in which they explored careers as lineworkers through hands-on demonstrations presented by Horry Electric Cooperative linemen.
